



The Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT)

The GMAT examination is the assessment for graduate business school candidates—it was designed by business schools to measure the skills shown to help graduate business students succeed in the challenging curriculum. It is a computer-adaptive exam that assesses the Verbal, Quantitative, and Analytical Writing skills that you have developed over time. Being computer-adaptive (rather than computer-based) allows the GMAT exam to determine a test taker's true ability by selecting questions based on previous answers. The GMAT score is generally accepted as a valid and reliable predictor of success in a graduate business school.



GMAT Exam Format and Length

The GMAT consists of two multiple-choice sections (Quantitative and Verbal) and an essay section called the Analytical Writing Assessment (AWA).



GMAT Test Takers

Individuals applying for admission to graduate management programs should take the GMAT exam. Because the market for graduate business education is so diverse, people from myriad regions and backgrounds, with varied work and educational experience, sit


for the GMAT exam.



Overall the number of Indian test-takers has grown by nearly 60% over the last 5 years as can be seen from the diagram illustration. Indian examinees now rank as the second largest testing group in Asia and the third largest testing group in the world, after the United State and China.

Furthermore, closer analysis reveals that the number of test-takers in their 20s has nearly trebled in the same period, particularly in the under – 24 age group. This is a significant shift from historic demographic trends seen in the GMAT examination. Lately, college graduates and individuals with 1-2 years of work experience are demonstrating willingness

to compete for B-School places. This added competitiveness has ensured that top global MBA/MSc. programs have added another dimension to their diversity of student backgrounds. For young applicants, a direct consequence is that there exists an opportunity for them to pursue a reputed B-School program right after college — provided they have the requisite GMAT score and a very strong overall application which leverages their strengths to the maximum.



GMAT Appointments & Testing Centers

GMAT Cost

The cost of the GMAT exam is US\$250.00.

Few General GMAT Insights

- One can take the GMAT once per calendar month and not more than 5 times in one calendar year.
- The scores are valid for 5 years.
- You will see your Verbal, Quant and Total Score immediately.
- Official Report is received only after 2 weeks (with essay grades).
- If one scores a perfect 800, one can't retake the test for 5 years

Few General CAT Insights:

- The difficulty of questions automatically changes as the test taker proceeds with the exam, depending on the number of correct or incorrect answers that are given.
- Scores are based on number of questions answered correctly and difficulty level of those questions.
- The first question that is given in a multiple-choice section is considered to be an "average level" question that half of the GMAT test takers will answer correctly. If the question is answered correctly, then subsequent questions become more difficult.

If the question is answered incorrectly, then subsequent questions become easier, until a question is answered correctly.

- You cannot skip a question; you can't return to previous questions; you can't change an answer.
- You must finish the sections; there is strong penalty for leaving the test incomplete.
- First few questions are much more important than the last few.
- Bad performance in one section does not affect the other section.
- There are 20 experimental questions in the test.

Common Mistakes made by GMAT Test Takers in India

- Solving questions using time-consuming methodologies: Consider 2 students one gets a question right in 30 seconds with 90% certainty; another spends 3 minutes on the same question to answer with 100% certainty. Although both test-takers get the question right, the latter will have much less time on later questions and therefore a higher probability of getting them wrong. We help you figure out which category you belong to and how to deal with, and organize your time around such hurdles.
- Choosing incorrect verb tenses: some Indian students struggle with when to use present perfect vs. past perfect tenses for the Verbal Sentence Correction (SC) section.
- Getting too caught up in the detail: many Indian students, especially from technical/engineering disciplines, waste far too much time memorizing small, irrelevant details in the Reading Comprehension (RC) section passages which in turn affects their performance in other sections.
- "GMAT English": The GMAT is an American examination. Hence it tests the correct usage of the American version of English which Indian students find confusing.

- Critical Reasoning: most Indian students who have not had the benefit of training in Critical Reasoning (CR) find this particular aspect of the test most challenging. While it might be tempting to use one's own opinion or real-world experience to answer questions, GMAT CR questions test your ability to process the information in front of you and arrive at a logical result.
- Math section: Although most Indian students find the content of the GMAT Quantitative
 part fairly straightforward, students often trip up in the style of questioning which is
 essentially reasoning/aptitude based. Our students are taught to master techniques
 such as "guesstimation", problem solving backwardation, relative conversions, process
 of elimination and world-problem-equation (WPE) building to name just a few.



Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ's)

What does ROADS say about current trends in MBA admissions?

Acceptance rates for business schools are steadily declining as more people are applying. In 2008 alone, GMAT test-taker volume was up by 10%. Furthermore, the number of test-takers under 24 has risen almost 50% in the last three years.

Should MBA applicants be using a social admissions strategy now that the economy has changed and the competition is heating up?

It is essential to put emphasis on both your GMAT test and work really hard on your application essays. Your applications should show that you are prepared for business school and are ready to contribute to the environment there. Make sure they understand exactly who YOU are.

If applicants get a low GMAT score the first time around, should they retake the test?

Students must make a concerted effort to prepare for the GMAT the second time if they feel that their scores aren't reflective of their actual capabilities. However at the outset your aim should really be to ace your GMAT first time around.

An increasing number of MBA programs are allowing applicants to submit GRE scores instead of GMAT scores. If applicants are given the option, which test should they choose? Is one test easier than the other? Less expensive? More respected?

Take the GMAT. The math is harder and thus more respected by admissions staff. Doing great at GRE math doesn't prove you're great at math, but doing badly proves you aren't.

Some of the people who have been downsized recently want to go back to school but worry about how they will address their lack of a job with admissions committees. Do you have any advice for the downsized professional?



Focus on positives. The economic environment is what it is right now, so just focus on accomplishments at past jobs, volunteer work, professional organizations and certifications, etc. Just build a profile they can believe in.

What is a Computer-Adaptive Test?

A computer-adaptive test (CAT) is exactly what it sounds like: the computer adapts to your level of intelligence. It starts with a question of medium difficulty. If you answer it right, the next question gets a bit more challenging. If you get that one right, the next question gets harder still. The opposite is true as well. This system continues until you get to the end of the section and your ability level on that subject is determined.

How do I know if I am ready for the GMAT?

The Next Generation GMAT

Not much has changed in the new format of GMAT (from June 2012 onwards) and the content of the newly introduced Integrated Reasoning section is actually quite similar to several already-tested concepts.

The GMAT introduces a new section designed to measure ability to evaluate information from multiple sources. The next generation GMAT will include a new 30-minute Integrated Reasoning section that will require you to interpret data presented graphically, analyze different types of information, and evaluate outcomes. A GMAC survey of 740 business school faculty members worldwide showed that these skills are necessary to respond to the complex challenges presented in business school programs and in today's information-rich business environment.

When the Integrated Reasoning section is added, the Analytical Writing assessment will be streamlined to include only one 30-minute essay prompt instead of two.


The GMAT will not change its quantitative and verbal sections; you'll be asked to make logical decisions with a clear understanding of a particular objective and to interpret and use numbers and graphs to make decisions. The scores along the dimension of 200-800 will not be changed, either. The Integrated Reasoning section will be given its own score, much like the AWA section today. Your "main" GMAT score — say, 720 — is going to be

instantly comparable to others, whether you take the test today, tomorrow, or in late 2012

GMAT scores are valid for five years, so it's certainly reasonable to take the test now if you know you want to go to business school within that time. We know, too, that some considering business school are worried that a change to the test means lower scores.

If we look back at the history of GMAT scores, we see that GMAT scores have remained relatively stable over time, even during test changes (marked by the red diamonds). Over the past 20 years, GMAT scores have actually trended slightly upward. Remember, that Integrated Reasoning will be scored separately—your Total Score won't change.
